

Do People Matter?

So God created mankind in his own image, in the image of God he created them; male and female he created them. (Genesis 1:27)

There are different views about people in the world. In England we have adopted the Christian viewpoint, but as our society moves further from its roots, other values are coming to the fore.

The Old Testament is formative for the Jews, Christians and Muslims, so coming from the Scriptures our view of people is based on the same ideas. Firstly, that we were made in the image of God, so in some sense we have a moral and spiritual and intellectual nature like God does. Secondly, we learn that we are fallen from our proper place, and our bodies and souls are corrupted which means we do things we should not. (Even though we often reason so well why we should do these things.)

About 500 years ago in Europe there were two intellectual changes. One was the High Renaissance in the south, where great artists, writers and sculptors were creating art with ideas from the new humanist (scholarly) ideas. Man was seen as the centre of everything, and the Church's authority was seen as equal to that of the Scriptures, and local traditions were brought into Church teaching. So, you have Dante and his allegory of Hell, and later, Michelangelo put in the Sistine chapel both the prophet Jeremiah and also a pagan prophetess of Delphi.

In the north of Europe came a reaction against this new teaching and a re-stating of the Scriptures saying that God is the centre of everything. The Reformation broke out after Martin Luther published his 95 criticisms of the Church. This led to ideas of the Bible as the supreme authority even over the ideas of mankind. Fast forward to the European Universities in the 1700's and the intellectual ideas of secularism started to develop, with the (then strange) idea that there might be no God. The ideas of mankind then were given free reign to develop science and art as we saw fit.

This has given us a wonderfully fertile and shifting set of cultures, where conflicting ideas circulate and with internet culture it is perfectly possible for people only ever to see ideas with which they agree, therefore unaware of contradictory ideas which could be better.

Democracy is a great idea where we all get a vote – a part in the decision making. But I don't think we would go for full democracy in all cases – mob rule is not necessarily the best way forward. If we deny the Scripture's teaching that all people are made in the image of God, and equal in His sight, then how do we measure a person's worth? Their academic achievements? Their contribution to society? Their relationship to us personally? These are very open to the opinion of the observer – and who is qualified to judge?

Presently our society holds that people are valuable and should not be killed. But while we remember that it is 80 years since D day and don't want to enter another war. The most noble of the countries of Europe in the 1910s were the Germans with a wonderful culture of music and art and literature, who were seduced in a few short years to become the brutal Nazi regime justifying the death of millions of people judged to be different from them. The Bible teaches that there is something bad in every heart, and without the Saviour, it is all too easy to follow the tempter's leading into a terrible life, where everything turns to dust. The Celebration of a New Ministry The Licensing of Rev Chamil Fernando

It was the church service that our community and Mayfield have been looking forward to for a very long time, a chance to celebrate a new ministry with the licensing of Rev Chamil Fernando as our Associate Minister within our Weaver Benefice and based here at Mayfield.

The service was conducted by the Right Reverend Matthew Parker, Bishop of Stafford on the evening of Thursday 11th of July and well over 100 people came to celebrate the new ministry, including people from all of the five churches in our benefice that Chamil will be licenced to minister in; his many friends from his previous diocese of Leeds, plus a whole host of clergy Chamil had worked with, including the former

Bishop of Leeds Paul Slater, as well as our own Bishop, our Archdeacon Megan Smith and our vicar and Rural Dean Brian Leathers.

And right at the front, to see Chamil licenced and installed in Mayfield was his family, his wife Evangeline and his three children.

At the heart of the service is the official licence from the Bishop of Lichfield allowing Chamil to be a minister both in Mayfield and across the Weaver benefice. This was read out by our Bishop, the Rt Revd Matthew Parker, Bishop of Stafford who along with our Archdeacon Megan Smith lead the service.

Members of the community were heavily involved in the service presenting Chamil with items such as a ceremonial jug of water to represent baptising new Christians and growing the faith, bread and wine to place on the holy table representing Chamil's role at leading holy communion and a Bible as a sign of Chamil's ministry of teaching and preaching.

After his official licencing Chamil was led to his stall by the Archdeacon and at that point Chamil became the minister for Mayfield and his first act was to announce he would be undertaking Holy Communion the next week and everyone was welcome.





And then celebrations began first in the church itself and then at the church rooms where possibly the largest number of people the church rooms have seen for many a year gathered to have a cup of tea or a glass of wine along with a biscuit or a sandwich to celebrate our new minister in Mayfield and welcome his family to the vicarage and Mayfield village.



My Month - Teenage 'Strops' and Mobile Phone 'Moments'

The BBC News service has a new feature which is called 'BBC Verify', where a team of journalists check the facts of news stories to make sure they actually are accurate as they say are. This has come about because of so much disinformation spread about by news channels and online social media that ends up making people believe a story that is simply not true.

Such disinformation is what you expect from political parties and activists but not quite what you expect much closer to home and yet this month I had a perfect example, but in this case not done from political motive, but purely based on age and perceived wisdom.

I was with my friend John who is the same age as me which places him just over 70. He was discussing visiting a friend's house and being in the presence of their 13-year-old granddaughter, who simply did not communicate at all with John, the visitor who had come for lunch, or even with her own parents or grandparents.

Initially she went off to her room to do her own thing and did not want to sit in the living room and talk to grandparents and guest. Then she was instructed by her parents to come down and join the group and spent the next 30 minutes before they had lunch, totally engrossed in her mobile phone and only coming up with monosyllabic grunts or individual words when questioned.

Both John and grandparents were dismayed at this, and the parents made an excuse that 'she's having a bit of a strop today,' but it appeared she has a bit of a strop most days visitors came from what John told me.

'I blame it all on her mobile phone', John says - an interesting analysis from a man who has no mobile phone himself. 'It was never like this in our day, we respected our parents, we never went off and sat in corners,' continued John, a man I note, who was never had children himself. He then got into his stride 'They should ban phones for anyone under 16 or even 18. What is the world coming to' etc etc . 'It wasn't like that when you and I were that age, was it?'

And at that point I began to channel the BBC Verify service and actually ask myself was John telling the truth and began to troll through my memories of my own youth to find an answer.

As you can tell from the articles I write in this magazine I have been blessed/cursed with quite a detailed memory and I do remember what I was like at that age when puberty hits home and the bright chatty 12 year old child, becomes a teenager and suddenly doesn't want to speak or hold a conversation with anyone older than themselves and in particular does not want to speak with their parents, grandparents or friends of that age group.

And in interrogating my own memories I found little evidence that our own generation where any better in dealing with parents and such like and the words

'Having a Strop' could just as easily be applied to myself and my mate John at that age as a 13 year old today. Put simply John was not really telling the truth and it may be that all of us delude ourselves as we get older that our children and grandchildren are worse than we ever were.

Our generation, when young, certainly didn't have mobile phones, they weren't even invented at that point and in some cases, there wasn't even a phone in the house ,but we still have plenty of ways of keeping apart from our parents and setting up barriers so that we needn't talk to them. Here are just a few of the tactics I employed - and I'm sure you employed, at that age as well.

First off there was inviting your friend back to your house from school. This meant you could both troop up to your bedroom, sit on the bed and discuss things relevant to you, out of the ear shot of your parents, with the bedroom door firmly closed and maybe even a homemade sign on it saying, 'adults keep out'.

There was no problem with a boy inviting a girl round or vice versa as at that age your friends were the same sex and the opposite sex was something we talked about but wouldn't dream of ever talking to - oh how quickly that all changed.

But let's not get ahead of ourselves we're talking about 13 /14yr olds. The key thing about having a friend round meant your mother or father couldn't tell you off and tell you to come downstairs to talk to them and so you had a magic half hour or more when you didn't have to interact with adults until it was teatime.

For your friend visiting, it was an equally blessed time for they avoided their own home and as for the topics discussed, well as I understand it girls discussed; school, which girl was most popular and maybe boys; whilst us boys discussed; anything related to football, pop music, cars, the latest comic books we all read and very occasionally girls.

However, having a friend round was not a long-term solution to avoid interacting with all those adults around you. But not to worry we had other methods of self-isolation and mine was the record player! Growing up in the trendy 60s, music and pop music was the big thing and my dad in a fit of generosity gave me and my brother little Dansette record players as a present when we were 12 &13. I think he thought we would be playing records he liked like Frank Sinatra or orchestral pieces, but hey we were kids in the swinging 60s and that meant pop and more pop.

I bought my first single record in 1963 with birthday money - it was The Beatles 'She Loves You'. I would race home from school and go upstairs to my bedroom to get changed and whilst I did so, put this, the only single I had on the record player and played both the A side 'She Loves You' and the B side I'll Get You' at least five or ten times each until my mother in frustration would shout up the stairs to 'turn off that bloody record player and come and have your tea'.

Mothers' frustration was quickly dealt with by 'acquiring' a pair of headphones that belonged to my father, but no longer used, as he had bought a newer, better pair.

However, the headphones came with more records from my father with the words 'You're playing just rubbish, that beat music's no good, you need some good music" and so he supplemented my single Beatles record with some of his own LP's including Glenn Miller, George Gershwin, Frank Sinatra and some popular classical music. I didn't really like them at the time, but it meant by playing them I kept out of the way of my mother's nosey questions as to what happened at school and embarrassing talks with other grownups who may be in the house.

To stop the complaint from mother to our father, when he came home from work, that, 'your boys have always got their noses into their record players, it's unhealthy!' (Substitute mobile phone for record player and you are up to date in 2024, compared to 1964), we, or to be more precise, my brother said how much we liked Frank Sinatra or whatever. It was clearly a lie but put father on our side.

For my brother, who was not as much into music as me but loved sports, his solution was even better. He persuaded our parents to give him a transistor radio for his 13th birthday and spent his entire time with the earphone in his ear, listening to sports reports and the pirate radio stations prevalent in the period.

So, in reality, we had our own versions of mobile phones, designed to keep our parents and adults out of our hair and they worked very effectively.

Now having verified all of this, I presented it back to my friend John, going into detail and explaining that he was in fact incorrect about the youth of today.

Initially he started to bluster, as only us pensioners can, and said 'well that was never me, I never had a record player when I was that young'and then suddenly stopped and a small revelation came over him.

'On my god your right, I remember now - you were obsessed with records, and I was obsessed with Crossroads the TV series. John related that whereas I would go home for school and play records to blot out my parents, he started watching Crossroads, the first episode broadcast just two weeks after his 12th birthday, as a way of avoiding embarrassing conversations with his own mother and father.

"I never really liked Crossroads at first, but my mum let me put the TV on and I could happily sit there for half an hour in my own world; then do my homework for half an hour and that took us up to teatime and then family time watching TV before bed' - all without much talking.' John confessed. 'I never realised my mobile phone moment was watching a soap opera with Noel Gordon. Perhaps kids nowadays aren't as bad as I thought'.

And having read this far, I wonder, what your own mobile phone 'moment' was when growing up?

Carols Recipes for August and September

Creamy Chicken & Pesto Pasta

These are two recipes, which are quick and easy, and also ideas to use the remains of that Roast Chicken,

Serves 2

150g Dry Pasta

200g Cooked or Fresh Chicken

2 tbsp. Pesto

3 tbsp. Any Cream Cheese.

Any vegetables you like perhaps half a red onion, mushrooms and a pepper

1 cup of pasta water. Salt and pepper.

- 1 chop all the vegetables, chop chicken into bite size pieces.
- 2 cook pasta as per instructions and save a cup of the pasta
- 3 spray pan with oil, add the veg and cook for a minute or two, then add chicken and cook until chicken is cooked(if fresh), add pesto and add cream cheese,
- 4 add drained pasta to the chicken and add small amounts to make a lovely creamy sauce
- 5 season to taste.

Chicken Fajita Wrap

1 WrapQuarter of an OnionQuarter of a Pepper50g Cooked chicken1 Teasp Fahita Spice30g any grated cheese.

- 1. Dice pepper and onion.
- 2. Spray sauté pan with oil and cook vegetables, add chicken and fahita spice. Cook until chicken reheated, Remove the contents from the pan
- 3 Add a wrap then add the chicken and vegetables to one half the wrap, add the cheese.
- 4 Cook on one side until the wrap crisps and the cheese melts and repeat on the other side.
